Tutoring Helps Learners Help Others

As a new MLP tutor three years ago, I had no idea of the amazing and far-reaching ripple effects my participation would have.

When I met Xiling, she had been in this country from China for six months, but her husband Mark had been here seven years, working in care homes for adults with developmental disabilities. They had planned to come here together, with their teenage daughter Chong, who suffers with autism. But paperwork snafus forced Mark to emigrate alone, kept Xiling in China another seven years, and even forced Chong to stay behind another 18 months.

Upon meeting Xiling, I knew that she needed a friend at least as much as a tutor. Mark worked long hours, leaving Xiling alone in a tiny apartment. When I assured her of my friendship, she told me she was the happiest – and most hopeful — she had been since she arrived here.

Xiling, a university instructor, and Mark, working for the World Bank, had left impressive careers to fulfill their dream of opening their own care home to help people like their daughter – an undertaking not possible in China, where there is little help for the disabled. He had just rented a house but needed help getting it ready.

Getting government approvals for the care home took more than a year, but in 2007, four clients finally moved in. All are much happier and healthier in Mark and Xiling's home than they had been in their previous residences, and everyone is extremely pleased with the high quality of their care.

Operating a care home is hard work, but Xiling, Mark, Chong, and the clients are thriving. Mark says that none of this would have been possible without Dave's and my help. Xiling passed her exam to become a licensed Direct Support Professional. It was a three hour test in English! I am so proud of her! Mark's goal is to become a citizen as soon as possible.

Being a tutor – and friend – through the MLP has been the most rewarding activity I've ever been involved with. Mark hopes to share his successful methods and experiences with others, and maybe open another home for more clients, so the ripple effects of my participation in the program may spread further than I would ever have imagined. ■



I read *The Matrix*. I thought it was awesome. At the end, it left me with a feeling that I could do anything...


Thanks to you, Andy and Larry, for the inspiration that I received from reading your screenplay.

Be Counted in the Census!

Every 10 years, the U.S. government counts its residents in a census. It's important to count everyone, because these numbers are used to determine the number of Representatives we elect to Congress and how to allocate funding for many causes. For instance, if we show there is a large population of English learners, more funding may come to schools and literacy programs for teaching ESL.

Students, please give information about your household when



you receive a packet in the mail or get a visit from a census-taker. The information is confidential. Your personal information will NOT be given to immigration authorities or other agencies. They only want total numbers and ask for your name only to make sure they don't count you twice. Tutors can help students fill out the forms. If you miss the deadline, it's OK to send the form late. We've Come a Long Way in 25 Years!

We proudly celebrate our 25th Anniversary this year! Marin Literacy Program began in 1985 with 5 students, and now we serve over 1,000 each year. Our students never fail to amaze us with their success stories: performing their jobs better, starting their own businesses, becoming more effective as parents and taking leadership roles in the community. In our 25 years, over 10,000 students have received free instruction – some native English speakers, some English learners from at least 30 different countries and 20 languages.

In addition to basic Adult Literacy Services, we have developed new projects over the years in response to various needs for literacy services in Marin:

1988 – West Marin Office opened.

1990 – Family Literacy Services established to give extra support and children's books to parents of preschool children.

1993 – Family literacy and peer tutoring developed at San Quentin State Prison.

1998 – Inmate Literacy Services established to serve both Marin County Jail and San Quentin.

2000 – FLAGship (Families Learning and Growing) began serving preschool children, parents and caregivers on a bus that travels throughout the county.

So what will the next 25 years bring? We plan to integrate computer technology into our tutor training and tutoring. We want to develop student leaders to help us with planning and outreach and to become tutors themselves. And we need to find new funding sources to keep these vital services going. Because of cuts in government and foundation grants, we must now rely more on individual and business donors.

Thanks to all the students, tutors and other volunteers, funders and community friends who have made Marin Literacy Program so effective for so many years. Happy Anniversary! ■

Support Your Libraries! Support Literacy!

The jointly-sponsored Marin Literacy Program is an integral part of library service at both San Rafael and Marin County libraries. San Rafael Public Library, faced with the same economic realities as most government agencies and private businesses these days, is taking a proactive, two-pronged approach to dealing with the future we face.

On the one hand, the Library, as a San Rafael City department, is in the middle of a series of budget cutbacks which have accelerated in the past two years. We have lost staff members and reduced our materials budget (books and other library items), as well as subscriptions to periodicals and databases. We have deferred some facility maintenance, and still we face more cutbacks in the coming year.

At worst, we are likely to face another 10% budget cut, and this will mean that we'll have to re-prioritize our work in order to keep our doors open for the most hours possible under the circumstances. Our ability to acquire new materials will be greatly reduced.

On the other hand, we remain open to the best-case scenario in which the voters of San Rafael approve a \$49 parcel tax measure in the coming June 8th election. This would augment current City support of the Library, garnering about \$730,000 per year, and would be

used to restore lost service and staff, reinvigorate the materials budget, and also to build up a savings account for our aging facilities.

A very strong campaign, "Open Doors / Open Minds," has emerged on behalf of this parcel tax measure. Please take a moment to go online and read about the measure at www.opendoorsopenminds.org.

The same economic factors that affect San Rafael Public Library have impacted Marin County Free Library, which is also placing a parcel tax measure on the June 8, 2010 ballot to mitigate a shortfall of over \$1 million. Revenue from the measure would provide critical funding needed to prevent reductions in library hours and services and would help maintain the Library's collection of books, CDs, DVDs and other materials. A similar measure will be on the ballot for the San Anselmo Library, as well. Anyone living in one of those districts – San Rafael, San Anselmo, or Marin County Free Library District – will have only one parcel tax measure on their ballot. ■



Many Hands

Behind the words we so value, behind the reading and writing, there is, after all, the arithmetic. In the quarter-century since Marin Literacy Program began, our operating budget has grown by a factor of 20, from \$31,000 to approximately \$650,000 per year. In 1985, we had a single funding source – the California State Library – and 44 volunteer tutors providing literacy services to 51 students. Fast-forward to 2010 and a financial system which accommodates the reporting requirements of three fiscal agents and a host of other funding sources. The beautiful upside, of course, is that our student population has grown astronomically, and in 2008-09 we were able to provide services to over 1,200 adults and 1,400 children with our diverse programming.

Much of that growth is attributable to a handful of agencies. The State Library's California Library Literacy Services provided nearly \$150,000 in revenue in 2008-09, and Marin County Free Library

contributed even more. The increasingly-crowded San Rafael Public Library provides primary office space and services, and contributes funds to offset personnel costs, while First 5 Marin (and Sonoma) keeps the FLAGship rolling with 1998's Proposition 10 funds. But the current economy of the Golden State severely impacts all of those agencies. In addition, as private and family foundations are forced to focus on basic needs over adult education, Inmate Literacy Services at San Quentin and Tutor Training have both lost grant funding.

Fortunately, we are blessed with a growing donor population, and our supporters – readers like you! – continue to surprise us, despite the faltering economy. We are pleased to announce that income from the 2009 Annual Appeal and from February's South Pacific Sing-along Film Fundraiser surpassed all previous efforts to date. Although not sufficient to make up the cuts that are trickling down to us, nor to enable us to restore staffing levels and office hours, the breadth of support is astonishing. Appeal donations ranged from \$10 to \$2500, and, even more gratifying, the total number of donors increased nearly 40% over 2008 levels.

The work of our volunteer tutors generates an annual equivalent of over \$450,000 in services rendered, an hour or two at a time, in slow, steady sessions dictated by the needs of their students. No one learns to read in a week, and no economic shortfalls are corrected in a single campaign, or by a single donor. In time, our students learn to read and write better, thereby cultivating opportunity for themselves and their families. And their efforts are heralded and matched by the contributions, small and large, of community members committed to helping them succeed. ■

Volunteering on the FLAGship

The FLAGship pulls up to the curb. We open the door and invite our students in. "Welcome. Bienvenidos. We are happy to see you."
