I find that it's a challenge. I'm hoping that something will click. I hope to understand that what maybe I've learned in previous years will come back. I will not give up this time. A Citizen Has the Right to Vote

My name is Juana Romo. I came to the United States in 1988 illegally. It was something very hard and scary to do, but I was lucky that everything turned out for the good. My husband was already in the United States waiting for me. My husband and I thought about living here for a few years and then going back to Mexico.

It's been 20 years now and we are still here, and the reason for that is our children's future.

When I got my green card I decided that my goal was to become a U.S. citizen. My family and I had moved to Inverness, and a Head Start teacher gave me the application and helped me fill out all the papers. I sent them to the immigration office and had to pay around \$350. I waited 6 months for an appointment. While I waited, I got a tutor from the West Marin Literacy Program who helped me learn English. We focused on the history of the United States to help me get ready for the test.



I had an appointment in San Francisco in December 2004. I was really nervous.

The woman that interviewed me in the immigration office asked me around 8 questions from the 100 questions I had studied. She told me to read them aloud and answer them correctly. I remembered saying everything correctly that day, but now I only remember 3 questions.

One of them was "tell me 5 of the first 13 colonies." The others were: "Who wrote the national anthem?" and "Who is the Vice President?" She dictated one sentence. The sentence was, "I want to be a citizen of the United States." Then she told me "Congratulations, you pass."

I had the ceremony on January 5th. Now I feel proud of myself. The reason I wanted to be a citizen was because I would get more rights, like the right to vote. A year later, I helped my parents get their residency. Now I encourage people to become citizens. ■

Simple Life

When I was a little girl [in the Philippines] I remember that everything sound simple. People go to work by walking, canoe or riding caribou. People used to walk everywhere they go.

My cousins and I went with our parents to the farm. Everyday our parents leave early to catch the high tide to take the canoe to the farm, so they don't need to push the canoe if low tide. Sometimes 5-7 people ride in a canoe. Because I was so little, they put me always to scoop the water inside, if it was leaking and had a hole in the bottom.

When we got to the farm, my dad put the caribou in the field to feed on the grass until noon. When the sun got

too high, he moved them to the shade. My cousin and I was riding the caribou sometimes, but mostly we like to climb the coconut trees. We ate the young coconut. It's very sweet, the fresh juice and meat. Afterwards, we went hunting wild fruits, like guava, papaya and rom-baton. Then we went swimming to the river, and waited for our parents.

We don't help much our parents, we go our own way. But, when planting rice, we helped them, because we had a lot of fun riding the caribou. Caribou walk around the field dragging wood. We rode on the wood, and sometimes on the caribou. Planting rice is lots of fun, but I hate the leeches in the field. ■

Marin Literacy Program Comes of Age

Like people, nonprofit organizations have life stages. First, volunteers gather around a cause and give birth to a program. Many programs don't survive past childhood, either because they completed their mission or because they were unable to get the support needed to grow. In order to grow into the adolescent stage, programs piece together funding to pay staff on a temporary and/or part-time basis.

When the agency is fully mature, it has permanent staff with secure salaries and benefits. MLP has had a prolonged adolescence, due to the cost of employee benefits for health care and retirement being nearly 55% of the worker's salary.

But finally, MLP has come of age! We now have seven core staff employees in regular positions with benefits. Long-term staff members finally have benefits they surely deserve, and we're better positioned now to attract qualified new employees.

Five years ago MLP Director Barbara Barwood and County Library Director Carol Starr began the process, but the biggest changes occurred this year with the help of David Dodd, San Rafael Library Director, and Pat Harper, County Administrative Librarian. The final plan includes more funding from Marin County Free Library and from the San Rafael Public Library, with additional funding coming from private grants. It was necessary to eliminate two posi-

tions, but we accomplished this without layoffs when they became vacant. The Tutor-Student Coordinator position expanded to full-time to absorb the duties of the Family Literacy Coordinator. The FLAGship Coordinator expanded to full-time, and the Bus Driver and Assistant were combined into one job. Our total staff hours have decreased, so we will rely on our dedicated volunteers even more.

We say farewell to Carl Kohler, who chose not to apply for the new version of the Office Assistant position. Thanks, Carl, for your many contributions in organizing our data and our office. And we wish a happy retirement to FLAGship bus driver Andy Twisdale, who provided more than four years of safe driving, attentive bus maintenance, and a welcoming presence.

Kaaron Carver is our talented new Office Assistant who has already brought us fresh ideas and streamlined office procedures. Carlos Espino, new FLAGship Assistant, has become a successful bus driver and is well-liked by FLAGship families.

We thank all of you for your part in bringing Marin Literacy Program to this exciting new chapter as a more stable and professional organization. ■

Inspired to Donate

I came to Marin Literacy after 20 years as an ESL volunteer. I love doing this work and learn as much from the tutor/student interactions as do the students. My own three students (from Peru, Iran, Japan) were quite surprised when I told them that I choose to donate \$300 a year (\$100 x 3 students) for the privilege of teaching them, and to help keep Marin Literacy funded. I offered them an MLP funding envelope and said that if they would like to make a tax-deductible donation of any amount, they could. They said they were thrilled that I asked. Yes, in the past they had received the donation envelopes but somehow the envelopes didn't get mailed until I mentioned my own donation.

This brings up the national news article that appeared in 1995 about Oseola McCarty from Hattiesburg, Mississippi. At the age of

87 she donated \$150,000 to the University of Southern Mississippi. In about 1920 she had had to quit school in the sixth grade to help her mother and aunt earn money by washing and ironing clothes. She had always saved every dime, but by 1995 she was surprised to have about \$250,000; in writing her will, after her donations to church and the relatives, she wanted somebody's children to go to college. That first student, an African-American young woman, received the first scholarship. It also received national news.

So amazing was the story that famous photographer Annie Liebowitz took her picture, to be included in a pictorial entitled "WOMEN," amidst famous and wealthy rock stars. We should learn from Oseola McCarty. Well done, Oseola! ■

Oh, How We've Changed!

Marin Literacy's tutor training has undergone some significant changes in the past year in response to the changing demographics of our adult learner population and in order to implement the helpful suggestions from our volunteer tutors and new trainees.

Historically, our training sessions required trainees to attend two consecutive seven-hour Saturday sessions, during which they were introduced to a variety of tutoring techniques and materials. The training addressed the

instructional needs of students with varying levels of ability. Both training sessions were provided prior to newly trained tutors being matched with their students.

The new training design features one seven hour day to acquaint trainees with some techniques and resource materials. They return for a second four-hour session after they have been matched with and have met their students, in order to review specific sections of their first day of training. Day 2 of training places particular emphasis on Goal-Setting and Tracking, Lesson Planning, and Selection of Appropriate Resource Materials.

We hope that this new design will be genuinely useful to our tutors at a crucial time, providing them with direction and support, as they embark upon their tutoring relationships with students in Marin Literacy Program. Please let us know how effective this new design is! ■

The Science of FLAGship Site Selection

The FLAGship bus and staff presently serve 13 neighborhood sites across Marin and Sonoma counties. We address the literacy needs of families who live as far south as Marin City and Mill Valley, and as far north as Novato. We have sites in San Rafael's inner-city Canal district, as well as out in the rural West Marin towns of San Geronimo and Bolinas. Our regular Friday visits to Bodega Bay's Porto Bodega Trailer Park and the newly added Two Rock Coast Guard Base in Sonoma County are bonuses to the week, serving more geographically and socially isolated families.

When choosing to bring the FLAGship to a new location, we consider several factors. First, there must be an opening in the schedule into which a new site fits conveniently. Second, there has to be a known group of families with at least 3-4 children aged 0-5 who are currently underserved academically and socially in their communities. The FLAGship no longer accepts requests from Home Day Care sites for new stops, because children at these sites are already receiving preschool services. Third, the site location itself must have a large enough parking space to regularly and easily accommodate the 27-foot FLAGship bus. Fourth, there must be ongoing support from a First 5 School-Readiness representative or other community leader to serve as a local advocate for the new families so that recommendations and referrals may be followed-up. ■

I am celebrating twelve week's success on the job as the Office Assistant, and feel warmly welcomed by one and all.


I'm still in that learning curve, so you will see me taking brisk walks around the area to stay refreshed and alert as I
